Racing Boats Qualify Today For Tomorrow's Big Show

Ripping along at angry speeds, sometimes up to 150 mph, more than 150 power boats will attempt to qualify today in the Eastern division championships at Eastwood park.

But only 84 of them will—12 in each of the seven classes.

Elimination heats will be held from noon to 5 p.m. to-day, with those qualifying advancing to the finals tomorrow, beginning at noon.

The event, next to the biggest of its kind, is sponsored by the Dayton Motor Boat Racing association in conjunction with the American Power Boat association.

Sunday's winners automatically qualify for the country's biggest power boat race—the National championships — at Guntersville, Ala, July 27-31.

As in any kind of race, speed enthusiasts are always interested in the fastest, the biggest, and perhaps, even the most, expensive.

In this race, it's the sevenlitre class. Boats in this class cost in the neighborhood of \$20,000, are over 20 feet long to compete in his Miss Crazy Thing.

The 1% mile Easswood park course is located just south of Harshman road—Route 4 and 69 intersection.

Proceeds of the race, at which 10,000 people are expected, will be turned over to the Barney Children's hospital.
